In hopes of sharing it with the other members of the tribe, they painstakingly marked it. However, upon return, they could not locate the trail and concluded "it has flown away". What we know here in Mt. Vernon and Vienna as "Flying Pond" has been beloved for countless generations.

Living with Loons - On Flying Pond we love our loons. However, their nests and nesting habits are fragile and vulnerable to noise, boat traffic, and changes in water conditions. Courtesy Boat Inspections & Invasive Plants - The future of our lake is dependent on keeping milfoil and other invasive plants and animals out of Flying Pond. Boat inspections at our landing and invasive plant patrols are vital to the life of the pond. Please be sure to inspect your boat whenever you are

Maine Boating - Maine law prohibits the operation of all powered vehicles, at a speed greater than headway speed while within a water safety zone which includes the area within 200 feet of any shoreline. As a frame of reference, most telephone poles are placed about 100 feet apart. "Headway Speed" (no wake) means the slowest speed at which it is still possible to maintain steering and control of the vessel. The purpose is to prevent shoreline erosion and damage to boats tied up to docks. It is also an issue of safety for swimmers and other boaters. Many, but not all, of these areas are marked by "No Wake Zone" buoys. Shoreline erosion is a major factor influencing water quality. 
